

Origins and tradition

• What is "Kamsale"?




- Used as an instrument for rhythmic accompaniment to singing and for collecting alms
- Taught verbally from one generation to another

- High level of physical strength, rhythmic accuracy and sense of timing required
- Starts out with a solo dancer who is joined by peers with the course of the music. Group size can go upto 8 to 12 performers
- Music is based on the mythological stories of Shiva (Mahadeshwara)
- Mainly performed by men-folk


Costume

- A white/yellow dhoti
- "Rudrakshi" neck chain
- "Vibhuti" on the forehead
- Orange-coloured full-sleeved shirt


